

## 22 WAYS TO A GREENER HOME

- 1-Don't heat an empty house: turn your winter thermostat to 68° in the day and 55° at night or when no one's home.
- 2-Buy the dog a canvas leash instead of nylon—natural fibers are better than oil-based.
- 3-Turn your computer and monitor OFF when you're done—sleeping takes energy.
- 4-Clean your refrigerator coils for a more efficient-running appliance.
- 5-Cancel the newspaper and read it online instead.
- 6-Buy rechargeable batteries. And dispose of old batteries properly.
- 7-Use cloth napkins instead of paper ones.
- 8-Repair leaky faucets, install water-saving toilets and showerheads and only run dish or clothes and washers when full.
- 9-Stop using toxin-loaded dryer sheets; invest in wool dryer balls—they work great! 10-Recycle!
- 11-Read magazines then pass them on.
- 12-E-file your taxes to cut back on paper usage.
- 13-Pay bills online for the same reason.
- 14-Buy a new houseplant; they are good for your home atmosphere.
- 15-Donate old newspapers to an animal shelter.
- 16-Switch to chemical-free cleaning products.
- 17- Buy bigger containers of things, or shop at whole food co-ops and bring your own.
- 18-Use compact florescent light bulbs—they last 10x longer that incandescent—or LED (light-emitting diodes) which last even longer. Dispose of your used bulbs at a recycler.

Please join us for our 2019 Annual Meeting at 12:30pm Thursday, October 3. We need everyone's input on our decisions for next year. And we have a real treat for you! We will be meeting at the Lake Superior National Estuarine Research Reserve (NERR) on Barker's Island! After you cross the bridge onto the island, turn left and keep left; we will be meeting in the first building on your left; there will be a poster on the door so you can find us. Coffee and "with it" will be served,

and there will be a tour of the Estuarium Exhibit after the meeting.

We are very lucky to have the NERR; there are only two on the Great Lakes. The system of 29 reserves across the US do long-term research and education supporting innovative coast science and management. The research done at this site is vital to the understanding of freshwater resources and the health of the Great Lakes which hold more than 20 percent of the Earth's surface freshwater. The reserve spans approximately 16,700 acres encompassing portions of the St. Louis River estuary and adjacent public lands in Douglas County. The NERR partners with the University of Wis-



consin—Superior and UW Extension to provide internships, educate teachers, students, and the public; and bring funds into our economy.

Join us for a day of accomplishment and learning---it's what HCE is all about!

## MEETING THE MEMBERSHIP CHALLENGE—

## Sue Hendrickson, Membership Marketing

It's October. By now we have all paid our dues, but we should also be thinking about how to grow so we can survive and THRIVE! It's a challenge for all organizations, but we want to be THE BEST at recruiting

new members (and keeping the ones we have)! Three things to remember are:

Folks can't join our clubs if they don't know we exist

People won't join if they don't get a good first impression

Members won't stay if their needs aren't being met

Not comfortable with recruiting? Few of us are, but every day we unconsciously persuade colleagues, friends and family to do things we want them to do. We just have to use the same principles and techniques to talk about HCE membership. Here's how!

**Be prepared**. Have a copy of our HCE brochure or newsletter handy to share when you explain what HCE is all about and what's coming up.

Reflect on the reason you first joined, and why you continue your membership. A personal anecdote relating to how HCE has helped you is often the most compelling. You know the value of membership—put that into words.

**Listen to prospective members—uncover their needs**. Are they interested in learning? in service projects? in connecting with others? Tailor your message to address those needs, showing specifically how HCE will be of value to them.

**Be enthusiastic...don't let objections throw you**. Objections are often a request for more information, or may give your member prospect a pause, a chance to think through the idea of joining.

**Follow up your prospect**. It may take multiple "asks" before they come to a meeting or join the group.

Practice these steps, and don't get discouraged. You love your HCE group. Share the love. And help HCE sustain and grow its membership by getting the word out there.
