The dresses sell for \$20 each and the entire amount will be returned to the woman who makes it. The Learning Centers are helping the people of Nicaragua learn cooking, baking, and sewing skills so that they can start their own businesses and eventually own their own home.

I took 18 Comfort pillows to Burlington Memorial Hospital, for the women that must spend the night at the hospital after having a Mastectomy. I delivered 77 Comfort Pillows and 48 Hats to Southern Lakes. Once again, they gave me an oral thank you for all our Stitches of Love and they tell me how the women really appreciate our taking time from our busy schedules.

Walworth County HCE 22nd annual mystery tour is now a memory. What started out as the best laid plans doesn't always go the way you planned? Eighteen HCE members 32 friends and one spouse patiently waited for the bus which is normally 20 minutes early before boarding time. Missed communications between the office and driver had the bus arriving at 8:45 which was our departure time.

Our first tour which was at 10:00, but were late was at the Octagon House and the First Kindergarten in the United States located in Watertown, Wisconsin. The museum is operated by the Watertown Historical Society who failed to tell the docents the Octagon House was being pressure washed that day! They did stop washing so we could enter. The Octagon House, five floors of solid brick construction completed in 1854, was designed and built by John Richards, a pioneer Watertown settler. The house is one of the largest single family residences of the Pre-Civil War Period in Wisconsin.

The house features a central spiral staircase which rises from the first floor to the tower room. The meals were prepared in the basement and sent to the first floor by a dumb-waiter. The First Kindergarten in the Unites States was begun in Watertown in 1856 by Margarethe Meyer Schurz, whose husband was the famous German-American statesman Carl Schurz. The building was moved from downtown Watertown to its present location in 1956. Its interior depicts an early class in session. Now it's time to leave for our next stop but they continued pressure washing the house and the entry was covered with water. I speak with the docent and say that we cannot go out through the entry as we don't need anyone to fall on the wet steps. We are taken down stairs to the basement and exit out a back door.

Now it is lunch time! Lunch was at Hi-Way Harry's Restaurant, Johnson Creek, Wisconsin. This restaurant is across the road from the Johnson Creek Mall. We were seated in the Upper Room a private room with a wonderful view. Our meal was a buffet consisting of Roast Pork with gravy, Chicken Parmesan with marinara sauce, garlic mashed potatoes, seven layer salad, and carrots, choice of beverage. The buffet was hot, tasty and filling.

Time to move on to the next stop. We arrive at Honey Acres, Ashippun, Wisconsin. Honey Acres is home to a honey museum, retail store and manufacturing plant. They jar and manufacture all their own products in house. The honey and honey products has been in the Diehnelt family tradition for over 160 years. In 1852, Christian Frederich Diehnelt brought his skills, knowledge and love for beekeeping from Rosswein, Germany to the meadowlands of Wisconsin. The new location, abundant with fresh clover and wildflowers during the summer months was the perfect combination to produce the sweetest honey. Five generations later and the quality that C.F. Diehnelt demanded over 160 years ago still inspire Honey Acres today. A stroll through the self-guided museum gave the history of Honey Acres.

Samples of Dark Chocolate Truffles flavored with peppermint, orange, and cocoa were available. The Dark Chocolate Mint flavored truffle has only three ingredients; pure raw honey, natural peppermint and coated with cocoa. They had Honey Mustard, Honey Straws, small jars of flavored honey and anything made from pure honey. Of course, they had a chance to shop!!

Our last stop was the hit of the mystery tour. We were at this facility for the first mystery tour in 1997. As the heat of the day was building I said that we would do the inside buildings but if it was too hot we would be back on the bus and return to Elkhorn! We were at Ebert's Greenhouse Village. W1795 Fox Rd. Ixonia, Wisconsin. 920-261-5645. Do we love a sale! All hanging baskets were 40% off in other words \$15.00. The most beautiful gigantic baskets I have ever seen. The bus driver said one each if buying!!! I think we had 20-25 hanging baskets in the bays under the bus along with other purchases.

Lemon Cookies
Ingredients:
1 box lemon cake mix
2 tablespoon flour
½ tsp. baking powder
2 eggs
1/3 cup vegetable oil
Juice from one lemon (2 tablespoons)
Grated lemon peel from one lemon
1 cup Vanilla Chips

In a large bowl, combine all ingredients and mix well to combine. Dough will be quite sticky. Chill covered in refrigerator for 30-60 minutes.

When ready to bake, preheat oven to 375 degrees. Once oven is ready, remove cookie dough from fridge and drop by spoonsful (approximately 1-2 tablespoons per cookies onto a baking sheet covered with parchment paper.

Bake 7-10 minutes or until very lightly browned. Allow to cool completely.

"Many Hands Make Light Work"

Cleaning and preparing of the Log Cabin will be Sunday, August 25th, 2019 at 1:00PM. They say "It Takes A Village" but it also takes HCE members and your help would be appreciated to have the Log Cabin ready for opening day. Since HCE will be honored as the Grand Marshals of the 2019 Fair and the opening reception will be held in the Log Cabin we want it looking good.



Items that will need to be done are as follows:

- 1) Open all shutters and fasten open.
- 2) Wash all 6 windows inside and out.
 - 3) Hang all valances or curtains
- 4) Hang long HCE sign on east wall
- 5) Wash, place 6-8 ft. tables. (2 for demonstrators, 1 along North wall, 2 either side of fire place 1 along south wall).
- 6) Put skirting around the demonstrators 2-8ft tables and cover with oil cloth over the top of the skirting
 - 7) Cover remaining 6-8ft. tables
 - 8) Cover electric box
 - 9) Hang Raffle Quilt (If time allows)

Items that will be needed: Broom, dust pan, window cleaner, cleaning cloths, scrub pails, hammer, wire, pliers, screw driver, etc. HCE has these items.

If we have enough available help and the cleaning duties are finished Sunday, August 25, 2019, and items for the display are brought they can be unload at that time, then if we have enough help we can continue setting-up, if we don't get it done Sunday,

we'll have to finish Monday, August 26, 2019.

If everything is completed on Sunday, August 25, 2019 and you had planned on coming in for just Monday, please give me a call either Sunday night or Monday morning to see if we will be at the Log Cabin on Monday finishing up! Call: 262-495-8522.
