She would not leave his side until Kathie quoted "To be absent from the body, is to be present with the Lord." After Frank's death and many years of co-hosting the Today Show, Kathie Lee then moved to Nashville, Tenn, where she knew people and felt at home there. 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Program Chair's Update Tomato Diseases

Who doesn't look forward to picking homegrown tomatoes from the garden? The flavor compared to what's available at the grocery store is out of this world. We may not have as big a vegetable garden as we once did, but just about everyone grows at least one tomato plant.

Some common tomato diseases to watch out for include wilt diseases such as **Fusarium Wilt** or **Verticillium Wilt**. Their symptoms are very similar and usually first appear mid-season after the plant begins to flower. The oldest leaves (located on the bottom of the plant) turn yellow and begin to droop. As the disease progresses, the yellowing and wilting will continue up the stem until all of the foliage is killed and the stem dies.

Both of these diseases are caused by a fungus. Fusarium only affects tomatoes and appears during warm weather whereas Verticillium can affect a wide range of plant species and is more prevalent in cool weather. Both pathogens can remain in the soil for many years so it is extremely important to rotate your tomato planting to a different spot in the garden each year. At the end of the growing season, because the fungi can survive in infected plant debris, you should also remove and destroy all infected plant tissues including dropped leaves. It's also important to grow varieties that are resistant to these diseases. Many varieties are resistant to both diseases and the seed packet will note them as VF varieties.

Another disease, **Tomato Late Blight** affects tomatoes as well as other members of the Solanum species such as eggplant, pepper, nightshade weeds and petunias. Potatoes can also be highly affected and in fact, Late Blight is what caused the Irish Potato Famine in the 1800's. This very serious disease looks quite different from the wilts described above. From the UW-Extension bulletin "symptoms may be found on any above-ground part of the tomato plant. Infected leaves typically have green to brown patches of dead tissue surrounded by a pale green or gray border. When the weather is very humid and wet, late blight infections can appear water-soaked or dark brown in color, and are often described as appearing greasy. White, fuzzy growth may be found on the undersides of leaves or on lower stems. Stem lesions are brown and are typically not well defined in shape. Discoloration may also occur on the flowers, causing them to drop. Symptomatic tomato fruits appear mottled, often with golden to dark brown, firm, sunken surfaces. White, fuzzy pathogen growth can also be found in association with the fruit lesions."

"Strategies for managing late blight in tomato include planting resistant cultivars, eliminating volunteers (tomato plants that have re-seeded from the previous year's crop), spacing plants to increase airflow and reduce humidity, and applying preventive and effective fungicides to avoid infection." 

Memories From Wood County HCE Members

50 YEARS OF HCE--

Submitted by Louise Egland in 2000-Born Louise P. Flick in rural Rudolph, Wisconsin, on September 4, 1924 to Albert and Philomene Flick. Louise remembers her mother taking her turn hosting the Hillview Homemakers at monthly meetings in their home, while Louise and her four brothers and three sisters were growing up. When Louise married Jasper Egland on September 8, 1945, the Hillview Homemakers again came to the Flick farm to help serve the noon wedding meal to the numerous guests who came to celebrate; but also the light supper for the crowd who traditionally stay all afternoon! Because of these fond memories, Louise was disappointed that her move to Nekoosa with her husband offered no local Homemaker club to join. With the help of Home Agent Cecelia Shestock, Louise and others in the community formed the 51 Homemakers Club in 1949. Miss Shestock suggested the name because it was the 51st club formed in Wood County. Over the years Louise held all of the various offices at her local level and treasurer at the county level. She sang with Wood County Chorus as part of the Wisconsin Homemakers Chorus at the National meeting at Chicago in 1954 and throughout the 1950's and 60's. Louise and her daughter, Peggy Wettstein, once again joined the state chorus when they reorganized to sing to entertain for the National Convention in Milwaukee in 1989. She lost Jasper in 2007; but her life is full with news from her eight grandchildren and eight great grandchildren! Louise credits her skills gained and knowledge learned in many areas to the hundreds of lessons she participated in her past 65 as a Wood County HCE member! FIFTY YEARS AGO-we had six centers where meetings were held; Marshfield, Arpin, Pittsville, Vesper, Nekoosa and Wisconsin Rapids. Our goals then were exactly what our Creed stated. Many of us worked as leaders in our church groups and as 4-H leaders. I take pride in the fact that my husband and I have together "racked up" a combined 60 years of 4-H Club leadership. Now our youngest daughter is leader of the same 4-H Club. FIFTY YEARS AGO-Wisconsin started a Homemakers Chorus and encouraged every county to have one. Mr. Emmet Sarig and Mr. Edward Hugdahl, professors at the UW, Madison put together a group of songs and with the help of area music teachers and accompanied by Mrs. Ray Clausen, the chorus was formed. Miss Loretta Zastrow, Home Agent at the time, found funds for a new piano; therefore, all practices were held at the Wood County Courthouse. Illinois did not have a Chorus, so Wisconsin was invited to sing for the National meeting at Chicago in 1954, held at the Conrad Hilton Hotel in Chicago on the Lake front. Marathon and Wood County hired a bus, so we rode to the National Meeting in style! Due to the "changing times", our six centers eventually became one, with all the lessons presented at the Wisconsin Rapids Courthouse. I hope and pray that Homemakers Clubs will be around for many more years to help enlarge and enrich many other lives.
