Budget Committee and Treasurer's Report, Margaret McCabe



Do not buy items, but if you have serviceable items you no longer need or use, think of HCE and WI-NP. At 2022 county-wide meetings we will have a collection tote into which you can place items for WI-NP, Wisconsin Nicaragua Partnership at Stevens Point; and eventual transport to the Nicaraguan Learning Centers.

There are many themes of needed items but we will focus on three categories.

- 1. Serviceable items you own, no longer need or use and are proud to pass on.
- 2. Items organized with like items together (like a baggie of buttons)
- 3. Small items placed in clear zip lock bags.

CATEGORIES, the lists are suggestions. You may have more ideas.

SEWING- needles, thread, embroidery, buttons, snaps, scissors, trims/rickrack

CRAFTS- beads, sequins, stickers, rubber stamps, decorative edged scissors, knitting needles, yarn

UTENSILS- wood or metal spoons, spatulas, whisks, masher, graters, cookie cutters, peelers

Because we will be storing these items until we arrange a trip to Stevens Point, please NO LARGE ITEMS at this time. For although WI-NP welcomes pots, pans, sewing machines etc., please consider storing at your home until later in the year when we travel to Stevens Point.

<u>Aging Well and Caring for the Whole You</u>, Mary Metten, Extension Kenosha County Health & Well-Being Educator

We all want to help when we're able to lend a hand, information, or a shoulder to lean on. Different ways to assist someone can depend on how situations present themselves and how we process the need. Emotional support presents itself in many different ways, one size definitely does not fit all.

Almost two years into the pandemic, there has been lots of talk about a wave of emotional distress and the impact on people at all ages and stages of life. Thoughts

and attempts of suicide have been all too common issues. According to the CDC, suicide is the 10th leading cause of death in the United States, the fifth among people ages 45-54, the fourth among people ages 35-44, and the second for people ages 10-34. Data also reflects that people who have seriously thought about or attempted suicide to be much higher rates.

Consider saving the following in your cell phone contacts or keeping them in a handy place, so you can easily locate them and/or share the information with someone else:

- National Suicide Prevention Lifeline: Assistance is available 24/7 by calling 1-800-273-TALK (8255) for anyone in emotional distress, thinking about suicide, or worried about a friend or loved one.
- Crisis Text Line: Assistance is available 24/7 by texting HOME to 741741 to connect with a crisis counselor via text messaging.
- Kenosha Human Development Services: Local juvenile and adult crisis services are available by calling 262-657-7188.

RURAL WOMEN IN ACTION

Last month I mentioned that our affiliate ACWW is currently funding 34 projects.

Project 1059 is Improving Access to Safe Water for Rural Women in Kisiwa (in the west of Kenya). Access to clean and safe water for over 800 low-income rural women, providing relief from long walks to collect water from contaminated water sources (local rivers) is being done through the installation of three 8,000 liter rainwater harvesting systems. So far, two of the three systems have been installed in this area where rainfall occurs for 11 months of the year. Prior to the installation, Sarah spent at least 6 hours a day collecting water from a river 4 kilometers from her house. She is now able to put more energy into her farm and vegetable business and the income from this has tripled and farm production doubled. Gentrix Kalama used heavily polluted water from a seasonal river 5 kilometers from her house. The children in her household had recurring diarrhea and she spent a significant portion of her income to purchase medicine for them. She now has more time to invest on her brick making business and spends much less on treatment of illness for her household.

Project 1028, India. Strengthening English Language Teaching Skills of Pre-School Teachers. 300 pre-school English language teachers in the rural areas of six districts of Sri Lanka underwent training in new teaching methods. They reported that they are more confident in class, and feel supported in their progress by the instructional manuals which were created during the workshops.

All of ACWW's projects fall into one of six categories: Education; Nutrition and Health; Sustainable Agriculture Training and Development; Income Generation and Livelihood; Sustainable Water, Sanitation and Energy; Maternal and Reproductive Health.

Rita Larson was invited by a friend to an HCE meeting. The groupwas called "Merry Misses", now the Merry Makers.

At that time, we had "projects" to choose from to present at our monthly meetings. I remember doing one on How to Decorate with Houseplants. I made arrangements in small and different containers to use in our home décor. I also remember the Christmas Fairs at Central High school and then at Tremper High school. It was a challenge to decorate that large space, but we had great times doing it.

Over the years, I held several county offices and was Southeast District Director. Those were great experiences. I met and worked with amazing women who really were community leaders and volunteers. At that time I was mentored and tremendously encouraged by the wonderful Phyllis Northway and Charlotte Jaeger. Such role models!

I also worked on planning a state conference we hosted and planned the tours for the national conference we hosted.

Then there were all the Style Shows! The first one with Sue Saves and Harriet Unger and fashions from Barden's. Such fun loving, hardworking, willing volunteers. We still have such good memories and laughs.

My years with HCE have been rewarding. I learned so much about community and the

many volunteers, and, of course, all the educational opportunities.

Dorothy Merten decided to start a group after attending the Christmas Fair, and Phyllis Northway attended our first meeting. For years I was known as Mrs. Joseph Merten, not by my first name. At some point we changed our club name to Merry Makers.

I have been Vice President, Treasurer, and Center Chair at the county level and president and secretary at our club.

I have attended Southeast District Meetings and state conferences over the years. They have all been educational, great experiences, and, most of all, I have made many friends. Besides April I invited Kathy, Ruth, and Dorothy as fellow teachers. I started the club and we must have had 75 to 100 members in and out over time. I am no Julie Pringle who invited neighbors with an annual picnic, but I have always been an advocate for this wonderful organization. I have always been full on - going to district meetings and conferences until recently when I have pulled back a little. I have held office 4 times and was Center Chair more times than I even remember.

When I joined we had over 300 members. It has become like so many other organizations as mothers devote more time to children's activities and even traveling for sports events, which we did not do much raising our children.
