Cut the Clutter- Tips for Getting Organized When- February 2nd at 1pm Where -McMillan Library

Description- Is clutter a problem in your house, garage, office? Do you ever move piles from space to space? Do you spend extra time looking for things? Do you have closets and drawers that are stuffed to capacity and overflowing? Are you tired of being the family's official picker-upper? Many Americans have a fondness for purchasing a lot of "stuff", which has led to clutter-filled houses. In addition, we are so busy that families have less time to keep everything organized. This lack of organization can cause stress and be a burden for everyone in the household.

If this sounds like you, no worries but it's time to take control of your space! Cleaning and organizing is often considered a chore but if you start with a positive attitude, it will make the task easier and make others want to join you. It is important to start with a designated space. Like a specific drawer, table, shelf or closet. One of the main reasons folks fail at organizing is that they take on too much to start off. The project becomes overwhelming, they quit and never finish. So, start small. Second, acknowledge that the process, no matter the size, may bring up memories and emotions that you may not have been prepared for. That is ok. Allow yourself the time needed to process and if it is too much, step away but be sure to go back. Lastly, set your timer! By making the process timed, you have a start and stop, and it is less likely to become overwhelming. If it is a large project, like cleaning your junk room that has been accumulating for 30 plus years. Doing the project in small steps like 15 minutes a day will make it easier to tackle.
