


Bristol HCE Club Meeting

Families Branching Out 2023

Another great event has come and gone. Hours and hours were spent planning, arranging for exhibitors, setting up workshops, arranging for use of the Kenosha County Center, and all of the behind the scenes "stuff", but it was well worth it!



We estimate that over 200 kids and adults participated in the event. There were about 35 exhibitors ranging from the Bristol Fire and Rescue to the Bookmobile, the Paddock Lake Lions Vision Screening, to activities for kids with the Boy Scouts, Wilmot High School Honor Society, a "rain tent" from Root Pike Win, to seminars about scams, line dancing, and the K-9 unit from Kenosha County Sheriff's Department.



The core committee of Donna Deuster, Jerin Moore and Donna Zarovy started planning for 2023 in late November. Mery Metten from Kenosha County Extension and members of the Board Margaret McCabe and Gail Gillmere were also an integral part of planning and executing the event.



Approaching Online Shopping With An Observant Eye

In 2023, many if not most people have had experiences online shopping. For some, it is a regular part of their week or month, for others, maybe it's been receiving items that loved ones have purchased online. The hope is you receive the package quickly, love it all, and that's the end of the story. Perfect situation, right? Unfortunately, that isn't always the case when we end up buying and receiving something sight unseen. Sometimes the item arrives and just isn't what you wanted, expected, or the wrong item shipped out; sometimes the purchase ends up closer to or in the scam territory.

In 2022, online shopping scams were the second most reported type of scam to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC). While there are federal laws in place to help protect consumers, taking additional steps to help safeguard can be helpful while you're shopping online.

- If the online company is new to you, do a quick Google search about the company in relation to reviews or complaints.
- Find and read through a company's refund, return, and exchange policies.
- Use a credit card whenever possible, as credit card companies often have the most protections in place when they are used to pay for items.
- Save all confirmation pages/emails, shipping notifications, and receipts or correspondence
 from the company while you are in the process of receiving and deciding if you want to keep
 the purchase consider saving the receipt if there are any warranties attached to a product.




