HCE Book Club News - Nancy Wagner & JoAnn Gadicke

The book we will be discussing is Firestorm at Peshtigo; a Town, Its People, and the Deadliest Fire in American History by Denise Gess & William Lutz. The story tells about how Peshtigo stood hard by woods so thick with white pine you had to feel your way through the forest from trunk to trunk. The town had more than its fair share of sawdust from the mills; slash, duff, and sap were everywhere. Fires had been cooking throughout the region for weeks before making their way to Peshtigo. Working from newspaper reports, letters, diaries, and meteorological reports, the authors recreate the genesis of the firestorm that exploded in Peshtigo and the surrounding sugar bush, killing more than 800 of the town's 2,000 inhabitants and many more in the backcountry. It was a fire so fierce it whipped up a tornado, so incandescent



that "hot sand had been spun into a glass sheet around a tree trunk." Human beings simply spontaneously combusted where they stood. And this thriving town, rich in churches and saloons, jewelers and lawyers, had no fire department. Gess and Lutz do an excellent job of telling the personal stories of numerous town inhabitants, from factory owners to the man and woman on the street, and in chronicling the aftermath, when a plague of army worms and parasitic flies descended on the survivors.

We will be meeting at Pizza Ranch, located at 3518 Kohler Memorial Drive on Thursday, February 13th at 11:30 a.m. Please pay for your lunch as you come in. We ask that each of you think of a couple of questions for the discussion of the book.

If anyone wishes to join the discussions we are always happy to have additional participants even if you didn't read the book. We always welcome suggestions for future book when we meet.

If you left early due to the dark and COLD night, or you just could not make it that night, you missed a wonderful presentation!

Two AFS students, Bechara from Lebanon and Petra from the Czeck Republic gave talks about their countries and lives. Power points were used. Both young students had a lot to tell us about. It was good putting faces to news we see on TV.



Bechara reported that in his county, there are Muslims, Christians, and Jews. They all live together and love each other. He is a Christian. He reports that the wars are brought about mostly by the politicians.

Bechara told us a harrowing story about his trip into the United States, that almost didn't happen due, first not having a "host family". Then in Germany a "tear in his passport". Having to fly back to Lebanon to get a new passport, then getting out of the country before the airport was bombed!

Petra is a beautiful young woman that was passionate about her homeland. We learned more about her family and her school and their celebrations. She misses her friends and family a lot. She facetimes with them to help with the loneliness. She lives only 30 minutes from Germany, so the family was very much affected by Hitler and WW II. Many relatives did not survive the camps. She wants us all never to forget what happened.

Both young students were fluent in English, and easy to understand. Both gave a very interesting talk that held my attention for 2 hours!
