I love their beautiful blue color. Mom just loves everything about her bluebirds and wants a clean home for their arrival! Here are a few facts I found about bluebirds.

Vibrant Blue Color: The blue color of bluebirds is a result of an optical illusion, where their feathers have cells that scatter blue wavelengths of light, rather than containing blue pigment.

Insectivores: Bluebirds are voracious insect eaters, consuming hundreds of insects daily, including beetles, caterpillars, and grasshoppers, making them valuable natural pest controllers for gardens and agricultural lands.

Keen Vision: Bluebirds have excellent eyesight, allowing them to spot insects from great distances, even from 60 feet away.

Monogamous: They are generally monogamous, staying together throughout the breeding season, and may breed together for more than one season.

Cavity nesters: Bluebirds nest in cavities, like old woodpecker holes or nest boxes, and are known to return to the same box year after year.

Distinctive Song: Bluebirds have a distinctive song, often described as "chur-lee, chur-lee."

Territorial: Male bluebirds are territorial, defending their territory from other bluebirds and even other species that might compete for nesting cavities.

Symbolism: Bluebirds are often seen as symbols of happiness, love, and hope, and are part of many Native American legends.

If you are interested in setting up a bluebird home, the best time to start planning is now, so you can build (or buy) the perfect nesting home, and find a spot that would attract bluebirds. Fall is a perfect time to set up your new bluebird house.
